"Co-response" means a multidisciplinary partnership between first responders and human services professionals that responds to emergency situations involving behavioral health crises and people experiencing complex medical needs. Participants in coresponse respond to in-progress 911 calls, 988 calls, and requests for service from dispatch and other first responders and include first responders such as public safety telecommunicators, law enforcement officers, firefighters, emergency medical technicians, and paramedics, and human services professionals such as social workers, behavioral health clinicians, advanced practice registered nurses, registered nurses, community health workers, and peer support specialists.

2022-2023 Legislative Session: \$2m Proviso



- UW School of Social Work (later BHCore) works with CROA to Encourage Fire/EMS Co-Response
- Proviso funds for behavioral health training for fire/EMS personnel and co-response innovation







BHCore Fire/EMS Grants Innovation Areas

- 1. Fire/EMS agencies becoming licensed as a behavioral health agencies
- 2. Fire/EMS agencies becoming integrated with regional crisis system
- 3. Fire/EMS agencies creating overdose response programs
- 4. Bringing co-response to parts of state not served by co-response programs

BHCore Grantee Achievements

Three agencies applied or are in the process of applying for behavioral health agency license; contributing to an online toolkit that will inform other departments (Clark Cowlitz, Poulsbo, Tacoma).

Three agencies started pre-hospital buprenorphine programs and new processes to connect people to care after overdose events (Spokane, Port Angeles, South County); one agency will start bup program this fall (Poulsbo).

Two agencies launched new, multidisciplinary teams in underserved parts of the state (Walla, Riverside).

One agency integrated into 988 response and will receive compensation for responding to crisis calls (Clark Cowlitz).
